Easter 3B (2024)

An old woman was going through great uncertainties about the Resurrection of Jesus. In desperation she sought out a priest for help. She expected some convincing arguments to prove to her, beyond all doubt, that Jesus came back from the dead. She was very surprised that the priest didn't take this line at all. His advice was very simple. He told her to go out and begin to do specific acts of love and kindness for the people in her life, and she would begin to see things differently. She followed his advice and in no time at all her misgivings about the Resurrection ceased.

The Resurrection of Jesus is an event which no one witnessed - no one saw what actually took place. All they were confronted with was an empty tomb. But far more important are those post Resurrection appearances of Jesus to various individuals like Mary Magdalene and the apostles – people who held him dear. You will notice that Jesus never appeared to Herod who treated him with contempt, or Caiphas who wanted Him out of the way. He once told them that 'they had no love of God in them' (John:5-42). In the same way Jesus didn't come down from the Cross when his enemies mockingly challenged him to do so.

A personal faith in the Resurrection has to be woven into the fabric of my life. That was the priest's advice to the woman struggling to believe. We have to live the Gospel of love before the Resurrection comes to life for us. St John says: "anyone who says 'I know Him' and fails to love is a liar". We will never know how to swim by merely reading instruction manuals on it. We have to put the book down and get into the water. We will never learn how to ride a bike without falling off it a few times. I will never witness to the Resurrection unless my intentions are motivated by love. We learn to love by loving as Jesus asks us to do. Saint Mother Theresa of Calcutta said that the greatest hunger in this world is not for food but for love. Before the people of Gaza ran out of food they ran out of people to love them and treat them with dignity. If we can go some way in satisfying people's hunger for love then our doubts about the resurrection will begin to dissolve. We become Resurrection people.

But it has to be the bread and butter of my everyday life. That's why I'm always a bit dubious about people chasing after extraordinary signs and wonders to prop up their faith. Jesus said; 'it is a faithless generation which asks for a sign'. Even in today's Gospel, after coming back from the dead, Jesus wanted to appear as normal as possible by eating 'grilled fish before their very eyes'. After that he showed then his wounds, thereby demonstrating he was a real flesh and blood person and not a figment of their imagination.

So, in our daily round let us be the feet, hands, eyes and ears of Jesus bringing the power of His resurrection to those who long for it. We become Easter people - proud to be at the service of our Risen Lord.
